



Besides the classic criminology and criminal justice curriculum, students learn about the most pressing current issues through special interest seminars. Students can also focus on a concentration area, including: Crime Analyst; Gender-Based Violence; Emergency Management and Homeland Security; or, Nonprofit Organizations.

All students in the Master of Criminal Justice degree program must complete the following required courses:

In order to apply please submit:

- » Graduate application, Part I and II (ucdenver.edu/apply)
- » Three (3) recommendation forms
- » Declaration of program form
- » GRE, GMAT, or LSAT scores, or waiver request
  - Applicants taking an examination should specify a graduate major at the University of Colorado in Criminal Justice (Graduate School Department Code Number 2202 for Item 11 on the Application Form; Institution Code R4875)
- » Two official transcripts
- » Current resume
- » Essay: a 1-3 page statement of your educational and career goals
- » Application fee (\$50; \$75 for international students)
