

STUDY THE HISTORIC CULTURE OF DENVER, COLORADO

The College of Architecture and Planning's Master of Science in Historic Preservation is a 45 credit hour program. The program is designed to accommodate the background and needs of students who have substantial experience and those new to the field. The course of study is designed for students seeking training in spatial, technical, and design aspects of the broader field. It encompasses architecture, cultural landscapes, preservation, planning, building technology, project management, documentation, interpretation, and representation.

Graduates are offered employment opportunities with state historical societies and preservation offices, historic sites and museums, conservation societies, city and state governments, heritage trust and nonprofit organizations, and environmental and design consulting firms.
