Students and First Amendment

Tinker v. Des Moines Ind. Com. S.D. (1969): Balancing rights of student/staff with obligation of school to keep order

- No viewpoint discrimination
- No well-founded expectation of disruption



Athletes in School Limitations

- Participation in sport a privilege not a right
- Athletes subject themselves to different rules and expectations as athletes
- Can be interpreted as fewer Constitutional protections
